A. WILLIAM DALRYMPLE

Before I went to college, I spent nine months backpacking around India. It was a trip that quite literally changed my life. In fact, in an ideal world, all school-leavers should be able to have a gap year like that before going on to further education. I certainly learned as much from living on a low budget in India as I did in three years at university. I'd had a very sheltered upbringing, so sadly I knew very little of the real world outside my home town. I've been trying to make up for it ever since!

It was at university that I got going with my writing, because the history department offered grants if you went on a journey in some way related to your studies. I successfully put forward a scheme to retrace the

famous explorer Marco Polo's journey to the palace of Xanadu in China. It had always been my dream to write a travel book, and this provided exactly the material I was looking for.

The trip itself turned out to be one of the most exciting experiences of my life, although I wouldn't dare take risks like that now, 20 years on. The time to do it is when you are 19; you are more adaptable, your body is stronger, your minds more open.

B. JODY SOLOW

It was my geography supervisor at university who encouraged me to undertake some research in the Solomon Islands as part of my degree course. There is no written language on the islands, but I was privileged to meet with village chiefs and tribal historians in my leaf house every day, as I gathered information about their complex land-owning practices. I wanted to write an article about these traditions before the information was lost to future generations. Unfortunately, my visit had to be cut short because I contracted malaria, but it had whetted my appetite for travel.

It was when I was collecting information for my book on Kenya that my survival skills were really put to the test. I travelled on foot with Bante, my guide, through the northern desert, where we built fires at night to keep the lions away and lived almost entirely on camel's milk and goat's blood in the traditional way. Bante taught me 64 different ways of saying 'hello' (there is not a single way to say 'goodbye') in the local languages. Living among people who were on the edge of starvation, but who still found enough energy for song, dance and endless teasing, taught me so that it is possible to feel optimistic about life, even in the midst of severe economic deprivation. I have no doubt that my tendency to bounce back from anything life throws at me stems from my time spent with them.

C. ANNE MUSTOE

When I made the decision to cycle round the world, I was 54 and unfit. I hated camping and discomfort, and I didn't even own a bicycle. What started it off was coming across a western man cycling through the Thar Desert while I was on holiday in India. Onlookers surrounded him, which made me realise that cycling was an ideal way of getting to know other cultures.

When I was a student, no one took a gap year, so I suppose one of my motives was to catch up with what young people now take as a matter of course. I felt it was now or never, but making the decision to do it was not something I could take lightly. It meant I had to give up my secure job and live off my savings, sell my sports car and exchange my designer shoes for trainers. It took me ages to pluck up the courage to take the plunge.

I've been amazed at the effect this mode of transport has had on people. It brings out protective instincts in strangers, and I've met with nothing but kindness and trust. But I would never actually have embarked on these trips if I hadn't already believed that 99% of human beings are kind and honest. It's just the media that focuses on the 1% who do all the mischief and make us think otherwise.
